

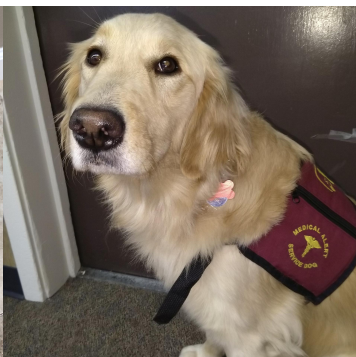


We are so excited to announce that we met our goal of placing 10 dogs this year!

Looking Ahead

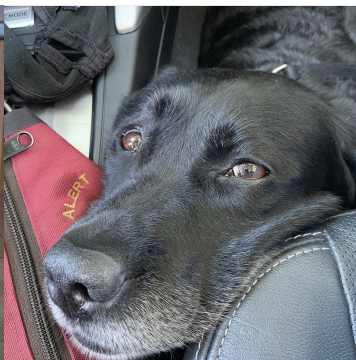

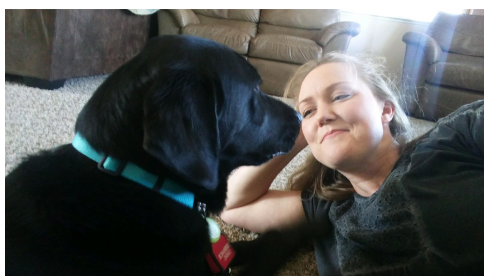

Early Alert Canines trains dogs to alert a person with type one diabetes of changing, high, or low blood sugar levels, preventing life-threatening episodes of hypoglycemia (low blood sugar levels), and reducing the risk of long-term chronic disease from hyperglycemia (high blood sugar levels).

We train dogs to save the lives of people with type 1 diabetes and help them live their lives with less worry and fear of medical emergencies, long-term complications, or death. We accomplish this by placing dogs that alert on a diabetic's blood sugar levels before those levels leave normal range, sometimes as much as *30 minutes before* our best current technology is able.

In their own words:

- "I've been Diabetic for over 20 years at this point. Only once in my life have I ever had an A1C (3 month avg) of 6.9. I usually hover around 7.1. I got Puff on April 29th, and in less than 6 months he helped me bring my A1C down from 7.1 (my levels 6 mos ago) to 6.6!!!! I am over the moon ecstatic. I know most people won't get it, but that's okay. I had to share cause this because it's AMAZING. I wouldn't have been able to do this without Early Alert Canines & my amazing, wonderful, loving and smart Puff. Thank you so much for placing Puff with me. My life is so much better with him in it." - Louisa Mendelsohn, placed with Puff in 2019
- "Remmy keeps Sage in the game. Without her persistence, alerting over and over until she is sure her girl is safe, Sage's blood sugar would have surely dropped too low for her to continue class. Remmy saves her life but she also helps her to regulate her life before she has to bow out. With Remmy Sage wins, not diabetes." - Rebecca Russell, her daughter Sage was placed with Remmy in 2016.
