Early Alert Canines trains dogs to alert a person with type one diabetes of changing, high, or low blood sugar levels, preventing life-threatening episodes of hypoglycemia (low blood sugar levels), and reducing the risk of long-term chronic disease from hyperglycemia (high blood sugar levels).

We train dogs to save the lives of people with type 1 diabetes, and help them live their lives with less worry and fear of death and other long term complications. We accomplish this by placing dogs that alert on a diabetic's blood sugar levels before those levels leave normal range, as much as 30 minutes before our best current technology is able to.

In their own words:

- "Since I have had O'Shea, I have not had to be rushed to the hospital... she alerts me 30-45 minutes faster than my blood sugar meter." Lia Nelson, placed with O'Shea in 2013
- "Ever since I got Waimea three years ago, I haven't had DKA even once. I haven't had any extreme lows, either." Monique LaBomme, placed with Waimea in 2016
- "...and once again Blue was on top of things, well before technology." - Sal Vitale, Eva's dad, placed with Blue (aka Honcho) in 2017 (pictured left)
- "I am privileged to help care for sick children, a job I can do because Nona is looking out for me." Dr. Matt Hall, placed with Nona in 2015
- "Even after only about 6 weeks, Brandt is already starting to take a little bit of that stress out of diabetes" -Lauren Loncaric, Chase's mom, placed with Brandt in 2019
